Important Announcements

The May 22 meeting will feature St. Croix County Horticulture Educator, Master Gardener, and beekeeper, Heidi Doering, who has put together a presentation on Planting for Pollinators. With the demise of bees, this has become a hot subject and one of concern for all gardeners. Heidi will give us a firsthand look at the need to plant for pollinators, the types of pollinators and beneficial insects, pollinator habitat and conservation as well as some pollinator landscape plans.

For this meeting, we will meet at the Unitarian Church, N8010 Hwy. 65, southeast of River Falls (south of the roundabout on the east side of Hwy 65). The meeting will begin at 6:45 pm with Heidi speaking at 7:15. Upcoming events such as the Community Garden and the Octagon House Plant Sale will be discussed also.

The June 26 meeting will be the first of our summertime tours. The owners of Goldfinch Flowers have invited us to tour their facility. Goldfinch Flowers is owned and operated by Bryan Gjevre and Harold Wilkins. Based out of Baldwin, Goldfinch Flowers specializes in cut-flower bouquets and cut-flowering branches. Bryan and Harold, along with an additional three to four employees during the busy summer growing months, spend their time tending to and caring for a variety of plants on the eight acres that make Goldfinch Flowers Farm. These plants are then sold at the Minneapolis Farmers Market and to wholesalers and retailers. Goldfinch Flowers Farm is located just 2-3 miles east of Baldwin at 2340 US Hwy 12. Harold has indicated the June peony flowering time would be optimum for a visit.

More Summer Meetings -- In July, we travel to Roxanne's in Emerald for actual on-site strawbale gardening; August will be to CR Stephen's Still H2O in Stillwater, MN for hydroponics and beer and wine brewing; September 6 will be a tour to Jim Madson's Gladiolus farm outside Clayton and September 18 will be Andrew Sankey with an English gardens presentation open to the public in Hudson. March Meeting Notes Speaker Notes

Diana Alfuth introduced all the new SCVMGA board members, all the new members and the newly certified Master Gardeners from the 2012 class. We then celebrated the milestone accomplishments of 12 members that had 150 volunteer hours, 10 members that had 250 hours and 7 members that had 500 hours. Their names are listed on the SCVMGA Weebly site under 'News'. There were three members, Peg Wastell, Donna Davis and Deb Peterstuen who had 1000 hours. And, there was one supercalifragilisticexpialadocious member who had 2500 hours, the unbeatable Carolyn Barrette!

Pauline Goerdt offered a number of volunteer opportunities. They are listed along with many more on the SCVMGA Weebly site under 'About Us'.

Discounts are available to Master Gardener Volunteers at many gardening stores by just showing your membership card. Gertens offers a 10% discount. *Northern Gardener* magazine also has a list of discount suppliers.

Peg Wastell went over the 2014 Seed Trial. There are still a few sets of seeds available. The instruction sheets are available on the Weebly site under 'Garden Groups'. The 2013 Seed Trial results are also available on the Weebly site.

"Growing and Repotting Orchids at Home" was presented by Esteban (Steve) Gonzalez. Steve lives in Stillwater in a home with an amazing facility for growing orchids. He not only has many grow lights but also has a humidity controlled room to be used during the most sensitive portions of an orchids growth cycle. He created an in-depth handout that describes the general care of all orchids, the different categories

of orchids and specific care for each category. This handout "About Orchids and Orchid Growing" is available on the SCVMGA Weebly site. Go to 'Gardener Resources' and click it directly (not the two option tabs that pop out). Scroll down the page and it's under a header "Miscellaneous."

Some highlights of his presentation include the differences between the seven types of orchids organized into family groups. The types range from easier to grow successfully to extremely difficult. The growing conditions that need to become more and more refined include the control of light, humidity, air circulation, water, fertilizing and repotting. The best starter plants are *Phalaenopsis*, *Paphiopediliums* and Terrestrials.

In general, orchids need an east/south window or fluorescent lights for 12-16 hours per day. They prefer a night/day temperature range of 65-85 degrees and high humidity. Bloom is induced by letting the temperature drop to 60 degrees for 3-4 weeks.

Other keys for success include buying the best, unblemished, insect free, strong plant you can find. Also adapt the plant slowly, mist early, use temperate, unsoftened water and watch for dehydration from your heating source.

Steve gave a hands-on lesson in repotting. Timing of repotting should follow the plants dormancy period just as it is starting to grow again. Choose either plastic pots with sphagnum or clay pots for faster drying or cooler. Soak and then drain your new media (bark), clean and trim your plant then soak the plant roots. Make sure your plant is firmly potted but not over pressed. Write the repotting date on its tag. Enjoy the beautiful, long-lasting blooms!

When you donate plants, please label your plants with the name of plant, name of variety if known, color, height, and preference for sun or shade. Use plastic or wooden sticks or paper labels. Stapling the label to the pot or wooden stick works well. We will have pots, paper labels and large craft sticks available at the May 22nd meeting. Plants should be dropped off in the back yard of the Octagon House on Friday, June 6 between 4:00 and 7:00 p.m. Use the side entrance by their garage on Myrtle St. You can also drop them off before 8:00 a.m. Saturday morning.

Wisconsin Master Gardener Association Update from Marilyn Gorham, WIMGA Rep.



Community Garden Update

Please come help!

May 16 is New Richmond Service Day -- the day 30 New Richmond High School students will come help us plant the Community Garden. Full of energy, vim and vigor, they will need some guidance on how to prepare the garden beds, plant the seeds and onions, lay the drips hoses and generally help SCV Master Gardeners prepare for another year growing vegetables to give away to senior meal centers, public health programs, senior living centers, and food shelves. The produce from the big general garden is all given away.

We need your help that day, and sometime the week before. The students will arrive about 8:00 AM. Guides, mentors, leaders, gardeners, teachers -- whatever we are called as volunteers helping them in the practicalities of gardening -- are needed to be sure the rows are planted straight, the seeds are put down properly, the broccoli and cabbage (maybe) sets are put in and the onions planted. We need teams of volunteers to work with the students in making the garden happen.

If it stops raining, and if the soil dries out enough that the corn stalks can be blown around to serve as mulch for the coming year, sometime during the week of May 11 to May 15, help laying out the garden, stringing the rows, and preparing the garden would be appreciated. Watch the Weebly for the date, and I will email our previous garden helpers with my plea.

Not only do you get volunteer youth service hours, we end the Service Day with a potluck picnic at the Garden -- food and a fun time to recuperate. The Community Garden is located at Garden Expressions, 2050 Hwy. 65, 1.5 miles north of New Richmond.

Rental plots are available along side the community garden. Last year one of them

served as one of the vegetable trial gardens, another chance to earn volunteer hours later in the season.

Community Garden History

The St. Croix Valley Community Garden was started as a Master Gardener project in 2001 to provide the opportunity for New Richmond citizens to rent a small plot for personal gardening. The first Community Garden was located at the Health Center, and moved to its current site at Garden Expressions nursery in 2006. The Garden is located at 2050 Hwy. 65, 1.5 miles north of New Richmond on land donated by Jonna and Dick Klucas.

The Garden is run as a community service project by the St. Croix Valley Master Gardeners Assn. The purpose of the garden has been to provide vegetables for senior centers, senior housing, the homeless shelter and Public Health food programs, among other recipients. The service area has primarily been St. Croix County with occasional deliveries into Polk and Pierce Counties. Over a ton of produce has been given away each summer and fall since its beginning. While other community gardens also serve as rental plots for locals, the SCV Community Garden is the only one that gives away all its produce.

The Garden also serves as an educational project: one of the plots has been dedicated to the Master Gardener vegetable trials for vegetables, herbs and flowers.

Every May, New Richmond high school students help plant the garden on Service Day. The high school volunteers have been responsible for planting rows of onions, green beans and other seed vegetables, as well as preparing beds for tomatoes, peppers and vine crops planted later in the month.

WIMGA name badges can be ordered anytime by certified MGVs, using the form below the link on the WIMGA website. You must be certified and current on hours (recertified) to receive a badge.

There is a \$2.00 charge in addition to cost of badge for individual orders. Dr. Mahr prefers group orders and doesn't place the WIMGA order until she has a large quantity of association and individual orders.

Our group order sign-up is at the January meeting. See Marilyn Gorham, WIMGA rep, at that time to place order and clearly print your name on the order sheet exactly as you want it on your badge. Payment at that time is requested.

The cost is \$6.50 per badge with no additional cost if it is included in the group order. Checks must be made payable to "UW-Horticulture". It may take some time for order to ship.

St. Croix County Recycling Looking for Composting Sites


