How do I become a Master Gardener Volunteer?

- complete a 12-week course
- pass a take-home exam
- volunteer 24 hours of service in the first year

The course is typically offered each fall.

After the first year, Master Gardener Volunteers need to complete 10 hours of continuing education and 24 hours of volunteer service annually to maintain certification.


